Dave St Clair spoke of how the town has talked every year about this. He said at the last town meeting that he was going to build one and he did. He wants to donate it to the town-it should be ready before the next town meeting. It is available now for a small fee. He is not asking for any money.

Barb Rehmeyer asked for the location (Pinnacle Rd.)

Sarason Leibler said that Dave did this with his own money. He proposes that money go from the Community Hall account to Dave.

Article passes.

Bob Bourassa asked if the balance had dropped to zero. Kyle Wright replied that it wasn't used. Article passes.

Bob Bourassa asked if the money is in a separate account. Kyle Wright replied that it comes out of Admin, R &B, or the PB budget. Article passes

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to transfer unexpended and unneeded funds, from certain departments to Surplus and to transfer Surplus funds to departments requiring the same for continuation of its services, and to expend un-appropriated funds to the extent necessary to carry on town operations during the interval following the end of the current fiscal year, until appropriations are made at the Annual Town Meeting in March 2013.

John Krueger made a motion to accept as read; Joy Hadsell seconded. Sarason Liebler asked if there are any unused funds or is this just a catch-all. Bob Bourassa asked if this is open-ended and should there be an upper limit. John Krueger replied that we have expenses between Jan. and March that we haven't voted on yet. This was the auditors' recommendation. Sarason Liebler said we don't want to change this article: we don't want to have to call a town meeting every two weeks. This is a responsibility of the Selectmen. Kyle Wright stated that this has been on every warrant. Luther Thornton said during the microburst, money was used for funds needed immediately. Article passes.

Kyle Wright made a motion to accept the article as read; Dana Philippi seconded. Article passed in the amount of \$148,000

John Kruger made a motion to accept the article as read; Dan McGovern seconded. Bob Bourassa asked if we had heard from the state (about rebuilding the roadway over the dam). Kyle Wright replied there will be a second public hearing sometime in April. Liebler said the State wants no part of it. There should be money available so the Town can move quickly should the

- dam need repair. Tammy (Reynolds) gets no money for her significant work on the dam which is dangerous and needs attention regularly. People should be trained to take over. Article passes.

Motion by John Krueger to accept the article as read; Dana Philippi seconded. Article passes.

## **Selectmen Recommendation: Town Decides**

Elise Brown made a motion to accept the article as read; John Krueger seconded. Elise Brown spoke about PACE. Maine is grappling with energy issues, 80% of homes use oil. This is a \$20 million block grant by the federal government to provide residents with the ability to receive loans for the purpose of energy upgrades. The Town needs to pass the Ordinance, then pass over to the Agency to administer. 137 municipalities have taken part so far. Sarason Libler asked who pays? Brown replied that it's the Agency and the homeowner gets the loan. Steve Chapin said that it is a financing option: the loan is given with a lower interest rate than other home equity loans.. Robert Brown agreed and said further that it is unique in that the payback is structured so that the payments are lower than the savings achieved. Kyle Wright explained the town's responsibility would be to provide administrative assistance to the residents applying for the loan. Steve Chapin said this is not an assessment. Judy Fuller asked why do we need an Ordinance? Chapin said the federal government decided to involve municipalities. The state had to pass a law; Maine has done it differently than any other state. Fuller asked How does EM get paid? Chapin said as part of a grant thy're allocated money to manage it—the 5% will pay for the program and continue it. Betsy Davis asked if we don't vote on it then we can't do it? Chapin replied that we have to vote yes on the two parts: the contract and the Ordinance. If we vote it down then it's one less option. Dottie Harrison reminded everyone that it is an option for residents in need. Bud Steeves objected to the Ordinance: said it's yet another government

program that sounds good and doesn't always end up that way. Article V, section C, "... the municipality must assist and cooperate with the trust" is wide open and vague wording on the town's involvement. Jim Caldwell said that it is an opportunity for the homeowner. John Kruger said there is no obligation to the town aside from requests from realtors. Mariah Williams made a motion to call it to a vote. Ordinance passes.

19. Shall the Town of Liberty, Maine enter into a Property Assessed Clean Energy (PACE) Program Agreement with the Efficiency Maine Trust and authorize the Board of Selectmen to sign the same? (Must be voted on if the preceding article is adopted)

John Krueger made a motion to accept the article as read; Elise Brown seconded. Bob Bourassa said that it sounds anti-business. Article passes.

#### RESOLUTION

20. Shall a Resolution entitled "Resolution to Abolish Corporate Personhood and Restore Democracy" be enacted? (Copies of the proposed resolution are available from the Office of the Town Clerk, and copies will be available at the Annual Town Meeting)

Mariah Williams made a motion to accept the article as read; Missy Hatch seconded. Williams said that Diane Messer had drafted the resolution (provided on handout) many cities have passed such resolutions. When 2/3 of the states pass this it should pass to an amendment in Article 5 of the Constitution. Supreme Court ruled that corporations are Persons, 5-4. Liebler objected on point of order. Andrew Worcester said the motion is to stick to the facts. Mariah Williams said the spirit of this is not anti-corporate. The founding fathers were wary of corporations. Willy Wilmouth called for a vote. Motion made for a written ballot: failed 20-32. Article passes, 36-23.

Bob Bourassa asked if money would attract more people. Chapin said they will pay people a stipend, but he doesn't know if it will make a difference. Article passes.

John Krueger made a motion to accept the Budget Committee's recommendation of \$9300. Mariah Williams made a motion to move \$200 from the Red Cross to Kno-Wal-Lin; Judy Fuller seconded. John Krueger stated he would rather add to Kno-Wal-Lin, not subtract from the Red. Cross—they've been making considerable efforts to improve. Jane Bourassa said she agreed with Krueger added that they are an important safety net. Bill Gillespie said that he has worked with the Red Cross over the years and they have a good relationship with the town. They do CPR trainings for free. Williams made a motion to withdraw the amendment; Judy Fuller seconded. Amendment withdrawn. Williams made a motion to amend the article and raise the amount for Kno-Wal –Lin from \$400 to \$600; Ben Kahn seconded. Bob Bourassa asked what the thought process was in making the decision. Wright said that the town gets requests from social services agencies which the budget committee and the selectmen review. Bourassa said the amounts should be left alone. Gail Philippi said that the budget committee meetings are open to the public and people should attend. Amendment failed. \$9300 passed as recommended.

John Krueger made a motion to accept the article as read; Barb Rehmeyer seconded. Article passed.

John Krueger made a motion to accept the selectmen's recommendation of \$17,314.78; Joy Hadsell seconded. Barb Rehmeyer asked what is the \$300 difference. Kyle Wright replied that the TAN is a note the town took out to pay the school district, it will be done again in May and we don't know how much we'll need or the interest rate. John Krueger said it makes no sense that the budget committee disapproved—we have to do it. Article passed.

# **PROPERTY TAXES**

John Krueger made a motion to accept the article as read with the Selectmen's and Budget committees recommendations of 5% and 1%; Dan McGovern seconded. HL made a motion to amend A. to 45 days; Dot Harrison seconded. John Kruger said that it is in our best interest to collect the money as soon as possible. Dot Harrison said in the past there was a discount to get

the money in earlier. Krueger said that when the discount was taken away, people still paid early. Bob Bourassa said that people know they are going to get a bill and should be prepared. The amendment fails. The article passed as written.

31. Joy Hadsell made a motion to accept the article as read; Dana Philippi seconded. Kathy Eikenberg suggested putting more into surplus as we go forward. We're still behind on paying Liberty's portion of the RSU 3 school budget. Judy Fuller said that we don't like to build up surplus because it doesn't earn much interest. She suggested 2 bills per year. Article passed as written in the amount of \$242,500.

To see if the Town will vote to increase the property tax levy limit established for the Town of Liberty by State law in the event that the municipal budget approved under the preceding articles will result in a tax commitment that is greater than that property tax levy limit. (Vote must be by written ballot.)

John Krueger made a motion to accept the article as read; Barbara Rehmeyer seconded. Kathy Eikenberg asked if we were making assumptions abou the school budget. John Krueger said we've minimized, we need to increase value (from new buildings), though there is not a lot happening now. We should be on the safe side and pass it. LD 1 is an effort by the Legislature to keep towns from raising more than the local appropriations—it's based on new construction. Kathy eikenberg stated that an increase of \$72,000 for Liberty is coming. A written ballot was taken. The article passed 35 yes to 8 no.

John Krueger said that SWLA was left out of the town report. Anna Feidler of the Sheepscot Wellspring Land Alliance reminded residents that their office is located at 44 Main St.

Motion by John Krueger to adjourn the meeting; Joy Hadsell seconded. Meeting adjourned at 12:11 PM.
